If the complaint allows we will handle it over the phone, but should we need to meet with involved parties in person we will try to do it outdoors – doing our best to limit contact and minimize potential exposure for all.

Writing this Street Beat posed its own set of issues because each day the news is rapidly changing and trying to hone in on pertinent topics was difficult. Things will return to "normal". We cannot wait for this to be over, we cannot wait to be able to shake your hands again, we cannot wait until this pandemic is a memory.
